<u>Dr. Horner:</u> Thank you Dr. Gover. Now, will our faculty please stand? This is an outstanding group of dedicated professionals who have led you well, wouldn't you agree, Class of

<u>Dr. Horner:</u> **Mr. President**, it is my privilege and pleasure, on behalf of the University faculties, to certify that these bachelor's degree candidates and dual degree candidates have met, or are scheduled to meet, all requirements for their respective degrees, and to present them to you for the conferring of their degrees.

<u>President Cost:</u> By the authority granted to Jacksonville University, by virtue of its charter and articles of incorporation according to the laws of the **State of Florida**, I have received the recommendations of the faculty, who in solemn session have declared you worthy of your respective degrees and have recommended the granting of such degrees.

So, by virtue of my authority, delegated by the **Board of Trustees**, I hereby confer upon each of you the bachelor's or dual master's degree from **Jacksonville University** with all the rights and privileges pertaining thereto.

Jacksonville University graduates, Class of 2018, it is now time to turn your tassels to the left-hand side and allow me to be the first to say congratulations!

Will the marshals now escort our graduates by rows to the platform. Continuing a JU tradition, we invite all family members to also stand as their graduate is announced. I also

<u>Capt. Leverette:</u> As the Commanding Officer of the Jacksonville University **Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps** unit, it is my honor to present these officers.

Later this afternoon, they will take the oath of office, and swear their allegiance to our nation and to our constitution. At that time, they will be presented their commission from the **President of the United States**, as commissioned officers have been presented since 1775.

Their commission reads as follows:

The **President of the United States of America**, to all who shall see these, presents greeting: know ye that, reposing special trust and confidence in the patriotism, valor, fidelity, and abilities of so named officer, I do appoint him/her an **Ensign** in the **United States Navy** or **Second Lieutenant** in the **United States Marine Corps** to rank as such from the 28th day of April, two thousand and eighteen.

This officer will therefore, carefully and diligently discharge the duties of the office to which appointed by doing and performing all manner of things thereunto belonging.

And, I do strictly charge and require those officers and other personnel of lesser rank to render such obedience as is due an officer of this grade and position.

And, this officer is to observe and follow such orders and directions from time to time, as may be given by the **President of the United States of America** or other superior officers, acting in accordance with the laws of the **United States of America**.

This commission is to continue in force during the pleasure of the **President of the United States of America** under the provisions of those public laws relating to officers of the armed forces of the **United States of America** and the component thereof in which this appointment is made.

Done at the city of **Washington**, this 28th day of April in the Year of our Lord, two thousand and eighteen, and of the independence of the **United States of America**, the two hundred and forty-second (242nd) by President Donald John Trump.
